UNDERGRADUATE RULES OF ASSESSMENT

Applied to cohorts which entered from 2025-26 onwards

APPLICABLE TO: BSc Data Science and Analytics

1. PREAMBLE

- a) These rules of assessment apply to the BSc Data Science and Analytics programme, which is delivered collaboratively between the University of Essex and Northwest University in China. They should be read in conjunction with the relevant Course Structure, Programme Specification and module outlines. The Course Structure will identify which modules are core for the University of Essex award.
- b) The course is delivered over an extended time frame of 4 years (48 months). The following credits are completed in each Year of study:
 - **Year One** (12 months) – 90 credits at NQF Level 4
 - **Year Two** (12 months) – 30 credits at NQF Level 4 plus 45 credits at NQF Level 5
 - **Year Three** (12 months) – 75 credits at NQF Level 5 plus 45 credits at NQF Level 6
 - **Year Four** (12 months) – 75 credits at NQF Level 6

- c) Due to the extended timeframe of course delivery the normal length of the programme is 4 years, with the maximum period of study permitted being 6 years.
- d) The Northwest University academic year comprises of two twenty-week terms, running from approximately the beginning of September until the middle of January (Term One), and the beginning of March to the middle of July (Term Two) each year. Term dates vary slightly each year due to Chinese New Year, which may impact on the exact timing of examination boards.
- e) Northwest University operates two main exam periods, the first at the beginning of January and the other at the beginning of July. Examinations for modules being delivered by University of Essex staff at Northwest University during Term One will take place in January. Examinations for modules being delivered by University of Essex staff at Northwest University during Term Two will take place in July. Reassessment ordinarily takes place in the first two weeks of each term, normally in March and September. An exam period is scheduled in May for Term Two modules for students in Year Four of the programme.
- f) When the Board of Examiners meets the following marks will be considered:
- Marks for all students who have completed a Term/Year but have not progressed to the next Term/Year or undertaken reassessment. In this case the Board of Examiners will apply the principles as set out in Section 7 to confirm reassessment options or require them to withdraw from the Joint Programme.
 - Marks for all students who have progressed to the next Term/Year or undertaken reassessment prior to the Board of Examiners meeting.
 - Marks for all modules delivered at Northwest University by staff from the University of Essex.
 - Marks for all modules delivered at Northwest University by staff at Northwest University contributing to the degree programme. These

marks will be moderated by staff at the University of Essex and presented to the Board of Examiners for ratification. The marks will be subject to a grade conversion (detailed in Appendix A) which will be carried out prior to marks being entered into the University of Essex student record system for consideration by the Board of Examiners.

Three University of Essex examination boards will be held each year in February, June and August. There will also be a resit board in September if required. The following results will be considered at each board:

- **February:** All Term One results and all available reassessment for all students
- **June:** Final Board for students in Year Four where awards are ratified and reassessment offered (where required).
- **August:** All Term Two results and all available reassessment for all other students
- **September:** Reassessment Board for Year Four students.

2. PROGRESSION THROUGH YEAR ONE TO YEAR TWO

- 2.1.** In order to progress from Year One to Year Two students must achieve 90 credits at NQF Level 4.
- 2.2.** Where the student has a fail mark below 40 in a maximum of 30 credits, they must undertake the first reassessment attempt in the failed module(s). The student will be offered one or more of the reassessment options set out in Section 7.1.1.
- 2.3.** Where the student has a fail mark below 40 in more than 30 credits overall, they are required to meet the requirements to progress before proceeding to Year Two. They must undertake the first reassessment attempt in the failed module(s). The student will be offered one or more of the reassessment options set out in Section 7.1.2.

2.4. Where a student has no substantiated Extenuating Circumstances, the student must withdraw from the Joint Programme in any of the following situations:

- a) where the Year Mark is below 20.
- b) where a student has undertaken none of the required assessment in the most recent period.
- c) where a student cannot complete their studies within the maximum period.

Following the first reassessment attempt:

2.5. If the student has still failed a maximum of 30 credits, the Board of Examiners will offer the following option to the student (where appropriate):

- a) To undertake the third and final attempt by taking one of the reassessment options as set out in Section 7.1.3.

2.6. If the student has failed more than 30 credits, the Board of Examiners will require the student to undertake the third and final reassessment attempt by taking one of the options set out in Section 7.1.4.

2.7. Where a student has no substantiated Extenuating Circumstances, the Board of Examiners will require the student to withdraw from the Joint Programme in any of the following situations:

- a) where the Year Mark is below 20;
- b) where a student has undertaken none of the required reassessment
- c) where a student cannot complete their studies within the maximum period.

2.8. Where a student has not met the requirements to proceed having had three opportunities to undertake the assessment for the module, and the credits cannot be condoned in accordance with Section 6, the Board of Examiners will require the student to be withdrawn from the Joint Programme.

Note: An Undergraduate Board of Examiners will reinstate the module mark for a previous attempt at a failed module if it is higher than the mark for the most recent attempt. The reassessment must be attempted in order for a higher mark to be reinstated.

3. PROGRESSION THROUGH YEAR TWO TO YEAR THREE

- 3.1.** In order to progress from Year Two to Year Three students must have achieved 165 credits across NQF Levels 4 and 5 (across Years One and Two of the programme).
- 3.2.** Where the student has failed a maximum of 30 credits, they must undertake the first reassessment attempt in the failed module(s). The student will be offered one or more of the reassessment options set out in Section 7.1.1.
- 3.3.** Where the student has failed more than 30 credits, they are required to meet the requirements to progress before proceeding to Year Three. They must undertake the first reassessment attempt in the failed module (s). The student will be offered one or more of the reassessment options set out in Section 7.1.2.
- 3.4.** Where a student has no substantiated Extenuating Circumstances, the student must withdraw from the Joint Programme in any of the following situations:
 - a) where the Year Mark is below 20.
 - b) where a student has undertaken none of the required assessment.
 - c) where a student cannot complete their studies within the maximum period.
- 3.5.** If 120 credits at Level 4 or above have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Certificate of Higher Education.

Following the first reassessment attempt:

- 3.6.** If the student has still failed a maximum of 30 credits, the Board of Examiners will offer the following options to the student (where appropriate):
- a) to undertake the third and final attempt by taking one of the reassessment options as set out in Section 7.1.3.
 - b) to proceed to the next term/year with the failed credits condoned. Credits can only be condoned as set out in Section 6.
- 3.7.** If the student has failed more than 30 credits, the Board of Examiners will require the student to undertake the third and final reassessment attempt by taking one of the options set out in Section 7.1.4.
- 3.8.** Where a student has no substantiated Extenuating Circumstances, the student must withdraw from the Joint Programme in any or the following situations:
- a) where the Year Mark is below 20;
 - b) where a student was required to take compulsory reassessment and undertook none of the reassessment;
 - c) where a student cannot complete their studies within the maximum period.
- 3.9.** Where a student has not met the requirements to proceed having had three opportunities to undertake the assessment for the module, and the credits cannot be condoned in accordance with Section 6, the Board of Examiners will require the student to be withdrawn from the Joint Programme.
- 3.10.** If 120 credits at Level 4 or above have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Certificate of Higher Education.

Note: An Undergraduate Board of Examiners will reinstate the module mark for a previous attempt at a failed module if it is higher than the mark for the most recent

attempt. The reassessment must be attempted in order for a higher mark to be reinstated.

4. PROGRESSION THROUGH YEAR THREE TO YEAR FOUR

- 4.1.** In order to progress from Year Three to Year Four students must have achieved 285 credits across NQF Levels 4, 5 and 6 (in Years One to Three of the programme).
- 4.2.** Where the student has failed a maximum of 30 credits, they must undertake the first reassessment attempt in the failed modules. The student will be offered one or more of the reassessment options set out in Section 7.1.1.
- 4.3.** Where the student has failed more than 30 credits, they are required to meet the requirements to progress before proceeding to Year Four. They must undertake the first reassessment attempt in the failed module(s). The student will be offered one or more of the reassessment options set out in Section 7.1.2.
- 4.4.** Where a student has no substantiated Extenuating Circumstances, the student must withdraw from the Joint Programme in any of the following situations:
 - a) where the Year Mark is below 20;
 - b) where a student was required to take compulsory reassessment and undertook none of the reassessment;
 - c) where a student cannot complete their studies within the maximum period.
- 4.5.** If 120 credits at Level 4 or above have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Certificate of Higher Education. If 240 credits have been attempted (including a minimum of 120 at level 5 or above), and 225 have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Diploma of Higher Education.

Following the first reassessment attempt:

- 4.6.** If the student has still failed a maximum of 30 credits, the Board of Examiners will offer the following options to the student:
- a) to undertake the third and final attempt by taking one of the reassessment options as set out in Section 7.1.3.
 - b) to proceed to the next Term/Year with the failed credits condoned. Credits can only be condoned as set out in Section 6.
- 4.7.** If the student has failed more than 30 credits, the Board of Examiners will require the student to undertake the third and final assessment attempt by taking one of the options set out in Section 7.1.4.
- 4.8.** Where a student has no substantiated Extenuating Circumstances, the student must withdraw from the Joint Programme in any of the following situations:
- a) where the Year Mark is below 20;
 - b) where a student was required to take compulsory reassessment and undertook none of the reassessment;
 - c) where a student cannot complete their studies within the maximum period.
- 4.9.** Where a student has not met the requirements to proceed having had three opportunities to undertake the assessment for the module, and the credits cannot be condoned in accordance with Section 6, the Board of Examiners will require the student to be withdrawn from the Joint Programme.
- 4.10.** If 120 credits at Level 4 or above have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Certificate of Higher Education. If 240 credits have been attempted (including a minimum of 120 at level 5 or above), and 225 have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Diploma of Higher Education.

Note: An Undergraduate Board of Examiners will reinstate the module mark for a previous attempt at a failed module if it is higher than the mark for the most recent attempt. The reassessment must be attempted in order for a higher mark to be reinstated.

5. FINAL YEAR (YEAR FOUR) – PROGRESSION AND ELIGIBILITY FOR AN AWARD

- 5.1.** To pass Year Four students must have achieved 360 credits across NQF Levels 4, 5 and 6.
- 5.2.** Where the student has failed a maximum of 30 credits in Term One, they must undertake the first reassessment attempt in the failed modules. The student will be offered one or more of the reassessment options set out in Section 7.1.1
- 5.3.** Where the student has failed more than 30 credits in Term One, they are required to meet the requirements to progress before commencing Term Two. They must undertake the first reassessment attempt in the failed module(s). The student will be offered one or more of the reassessment options set out in Section 7.1.2.
- 5.4.** Where a student has no substantiated Extenuating Circumstances, the student must withdraw from the Joint Programme in any of the following situations:
 - a) where the Year Mark is below 20;
 - b) where a student was required to take compulsory reassessment and undertook none of the reassessment;
 - c) where a student cannot complete their studies within the maximum period.

5.5. If 120 credits at Level 4 or above have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Certificate of Higher Education. If 240 credits have been attempted (including a minimum of 120 at level 5 or above), and 225 have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Diploma of Higher Education. If 300 credits or more have been passed, with 60 credits or more at Level 6, the student will be considered for the award of an Ordinary Degree, which is unclassified.

Following the first reassessment attempt (Term One modules):

5.6. If the student has still failed a maximum of 30 credits, the Board of Examiners will offer the following options to the student:

- a) to undertake the third and final attempt by taking one of the reassessment options as set out in Section 7.1.3.
- b) to proceed with the failed credits condoned. Credits can only be condoned as set out in Section 6.

5.7. If the student has failed more than 30 credits, the Board of Examiners will require the student to undertake the third and final assessment attempt by taking one of the options set out in Section 7.1.4.

5.8. Where a student has no substantiated Extenuating Circumstances, the student must withdraw from the Joint Programme in any of the following situations:

- a) where the Year Mark is below 20;
- b) where a student was required to take compulsory reassessment and undertook none of the reassessment;
- c) where a student cannot complete their studies within the maximum period.

- 5.9.** Where a student has not met the requirements to proceed having had three opportunities to undertake the assessment for the module, and the credits cannot be condoned in accordance with Section 6, the Board of Examiners will require the student to be withdrawn from the Joint Programme.
- 5.10.** If 120 credits at Level 4 or above have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Certificate of Higher Education. If 240 credits have been attempted (including a minimum of 120 at level 5 or above), and 225 have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Diploma of Higher Education. If 300 credits or more have been passed, with 60 credits or more at Level 6, the student will be considered for the award of an Ordinary Degree, which is unclassified.

Note: An Undergraduate Board of Examiners will reinstate the module mark for a previous attempt at a failed module if it is higher than the mark for the most recent attempt. The reassessment must be attempted in order for a higher mark to be reinstated.

Reassessment at the end of the Year

- 5.11.** If a student does not meet the requirements to pass and complete their degree, but achieves a Year Mark of 20 or above, they may be offered reassessment. The reassessment offered will depend on how many credits have been failed in the Final Year and whether they have any failed credits from previous years. A student can fail a maximum of 30 non-core credits across the whole of their degree.
- 5.12.** In the Final Year a student will be offered compulsory reassessment in the minimum number of credits needed to obtain a degree, up to a maximum of 60 credits, before the new Academic Year begins. Where appropriate, a combination of compulsory and voluntary reassessment will be offered up to a total of 60 credits. Module Mark(s) will be capped at 40. If this reassessment is failed and the student cannot complete their degree, they can then be offered further reassessment for more than 60 credits. Table 5.1 shows the reassessment opportunities available in the Final Year.

- 5.13.** If a student needs to take reassessment in more than 60 credits and cannot complete their degree, they will be offered one or more of the following opportunities:
- a) A full-time repeat year for uncapped Module Marks;
 - b) A part-time repeat year for up to 105 credits for uncapped Module Marks;
- 5.14.** Following reassessment, if the requirements to be awarded the degree are not met but the student achieves a Year Mark of 20 or above, they may be offered one or more of the opportunities below. The Board of Examiners will only offer compulsory reassessment for the minimum number of credits needed to pass the degree but will allow a student to undertake additional reassessment. For example, if a student has failed 60 non-core credits in the Final Year (having failed no other modules in earlier years) they will only be required to take reassessment in 30 credits, but may choose up to 60 credits.
- a) A full-time repeat year for uncapped Module Marks;
 - b) A part-time repeat year for up to 105 credits for uncapped Module Marks;
- 5.15.** Where a student cannot complete their studies, having had three opportunities to undertake the assessment for the module, and the credits cannot be condoned in accordance with Section 6, the Board of Examiners will require the student to be withdrawn from the Joint Programme.
- 5.16.** If 120 credits at Level 4 or above have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Certificate of Higher Education. If 240 credits have been attempted (including a minimum of 120 at level 5 or above), and 225 have been passed, the student will be considered for the award of a Diploma of Higher Education. If 300 credits or more have been passed, with 60 credits or more at Level 6, the student will be considered for the award of an Ordinary Degree, which is unclassified.

Degree Eligibility and Classification

- 5.17.** To achieve an Honours Degree, a student must attempt 360 credits and pass at least 330 credits across the degree with at least 90 credits at Level 6. All core modules must be passed.
- 5.18.** Year Marks are calculated as weighted averages using rounded Module Aggregate Marks. Module Aggregate Marks are used to calculate this based on the credit value of the module, i.e., a 30-credit module counts as twice as much as a 15-credit module towards the overall Year Mark.
- 5.19.** Marks from Levels 5 and 6 are used to calculate an overall Degree Mark. The Level 5 Average mark counts as 40% and the Level 6 Average mark counts as 60%. The Degree Mark is used to determine the Degree Class. This is set out in Table 5.2 below.
- 5.20.** A degree is classified using the Degree Mark. If the Degree Mark is within two marks of the next Classification, a student will receive the higher Class if they have at least 120 credits across Levels 5 and 6 in the higher Class (as set out in Table 5.2 below).
- 5.21.** Module Aggregate Marks, Year Marks and the Degree Mark are rounded to the nearest whole number, with half marks (i.e., 0.5) or more being rounded up.

Table 5.2: Honours Degree Classifications

6. CONDONING FAILS

- 6.1.** Northwest University students are only able to condone a maximum of 30 failed credits in non-core modules during their period of study. Opportunities for condoning Year One modules will not be considered until Year Two study has been completed.
- 6.2.** Following reassessment, where a student has a fail mark below 40 in a maximum of 30 credits of non-core modules, the Board will treat the fails in the following way:
- a) Where a student has not had three attempts at the assessment for the failed module the Board will offer the student the choice of either undertaking reassessment in the module before progressing to the next year or proceeding to the next year carrying the fail.
 - b) Where a student has already had three attempts at the assessment for the failed module the Board will permit the student to proceed to the next term carrying the fail.

- 6.3.** Credits can only be condoned if reassessment has been attempted. Where a student has undertaken none of the required assessment and has no substantiated Extenuating Circumstances, they will be withdrawn from the Joint Programme.

7. REASSESSMENT OPTIONS

- 7.1.** The following reassessment options are available to Northwest University students:

First attempt at reassessment:

- 7.1.1.** Where a student has failed a maximum of 30 credits, the Board of Examiners may offer the following reassessment options:

- a) Progress to the next term and undertake the necessary reassessment in the failed module(s) alongside the modules for the term, at the next available reassessment opportunity. The module aggregate for the reassessed module(s) will be capped at 40.
- b) Suspend progression to the next term and repeat the failed module(s) with attendance for uncapped module marks the following year. At the February board, where reassessment includes a final attempt, this can be attempted prior to the repeat year. The results of this reassessment will be considered at the summer board. Therefore, the final attempt will not be carried into the Repeat Year.

- 7.1.2.** Where the student has failed more than 30 credits, the Board of Examiners may offer the following reassessment options:

- a) Suspend progression to the next term and repeat the failed module(s) with attendance for uncapped module marks the following year. At the February board, where reassessment includes a final attempt, this can be attempted prior to the repeat year. The results of this reassessment will be considered at the August board. Therefore, the final attempt will not be carried into the Repeat Year.

- b) Suspend progression to the next term and repeat the previous year of study for uncapped module marks the following year. At the February board, where reassessment includes a final attempt, this can be attempted prior to the repeat year. The results of this reassessment will be considered at the August board. Therefore, the final attempt will not be carried into the Repeat Year.

After the first reassessment attempt:

7.1.3. Where a student has failed a maximum of 30 credits, the Board of Examiners may offer one or more of the following reassessment options:

- a) Progress to the next term and undertake the necessary reassessment in the failed module(s) alongside the modules for the next term. The module aggregate for the reassessed module(s) will be capped at 40.
- b) Suspend progression to the next term and repeat the failed module(s) with attendance for uncapped module marks the following year. At the February board, where reassessment includes a final attempt, this can be attempted prior to the repeat year. The results of this reassessment will be considered at the August board. Therefore, the final attempt will not be carried into the Repeat Year.
- c) Condone up to 30 failed non-core credits (only permitted in accordance with Section 6).
- d) Condone 15 failed non-core credits (only permitted in accordance with Section 6) and undertake one of the reassessment options listed above.

7.1.4. Where a student has failed more than 30 credits, the Board of Examiners may offer one of the following reassessment options:

- a) Suspend progression to the next term and repeat the failed module(s) with attendance for uncapped module marks the following year. At the February board, where reassessment includes a final attempt, this can be attempted prior to the repeat year. The results of this reassessment will be considered at

the summer board. Therefore, the final attempt will not be carried into the Repeat Year.

- b) Suspend progression to the next term and repeat the previous year of study for uncapped module marks the following year. At the February board, where reassessment includes a final attempt, this can be attempted prior to the repeat year. The results of this reassessment will be considered at the August board. Therefore, the final attempt will not be carried into the Repeat Year.
- c) Condone up to 30 non-core credits (only permitted in accordance with Section 6) and undertake one of the reassessment options listed above.
- d) Condone 15 failed non-core credits (only permitted in accordance with Section 6) and undertake one of the reassessment options listed above.

Appendix A

Marks will be converted for modules delivered by Northwest University according to the following scale. Due to the non-linear conversion method, all marks will be converted (coursework aggregate, exam and calculated module aggregate). The converted module aggregate mark will be used for progress decisions. In a case where the module aggregate indicates failure, the converted coursework aggregate and converted exam mark will be used to determine the component/s that need to be reassessed.

Module aggregate marks are rounded to the nearest whole number, with half marks (i.e. 0.5) or more being rounded up.
