### STEM BUILDING OPEN


Residents have started to move into the new STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) building, ready for the start of the new academic year.

The £15 million five-storey building features state of the art facilities including: a 200-seat IT exploratory learning space, an exhibition space, laboratories, a new café, Bytes, and a 180-seat wet lab at the School of Biological Sciences.

Project Manager Chris Woodman said: "The new STEM building is a very exciting development for our Colchester Campus and promises to be a fantastic facility that will give all our students the very best chance of success. It will transform Square 1 into a dedicated science square with new collaborative learning spaces and interdisciplinary teaching facilities – as well as social space to continue our outreach work with local schools."

Paul Cavalier, Partner at Ingleton Wood, the property and construction consultancy, added: "The building has been designed to meet the university's environmental targets, helping to reduce the Colchester Campus's carbon footprint".

# LOUGHTON POND – ESTATES CLEAN-UP

The pond at the Loughton Campus is transformed following a massive clean-up over the summer. The pond is around 30 metres by 15 metres in size, and holds 76,000 litres in the water. The surrounding area to the pond is home to various willow trees and greenery. The water itself hosts a variety of wildlife including frogs, toads, water snails, insects and tadpoles.

Large amounts of duckweed had gathered in the pond and existing pump was not enough to move the water around, causing it to stagnate and smell.

The clean-up dredged up lots of rubbish, debris, waste and even a large tree trunk. An extra pump and an ESPA water system were added to help irrigation and provide an efficient water management system.
