Overview

Our Objectives

- work towards social justice in general and enhance access to justice to those most in need
- instil in students the desire, values and skills to do so
- work closely with the community to identify and meet unmet legal need

Our Activities

- Provide free legal advice and limited forms of representation under supervision of staff (case work)
- Engage in wide range of non-client facing activities which enhance social justice such as public legal education, law reform and investigating miscarriages of justice (project work)

University of Essex

Our People

- Five academic members of staff and one administrator
- Over 200 current student volunteer members
 - c. 100 silver members (caseworkers and projects)
 - c. 110 bronze members (projects only)

Our model

Funded by the School of Law to:

- provide a practical educational experience for students, and
- to serve the community's unmet legal need

Extra-curricular

- Student volunteers
- Outside their legal studies
- Introduction to social welfare issues and the culture of pro bono

Academic module

- Credit bearing module
- In-depth training in casework skills and ethics

Case work

Free but not currently means tested

Initial advice only

- Student-led
- Supervised
- Limited 'next-steps work', under development

On campus clinic (weekly, by appointment)

- Tendring Partnership (across schools in the Tendring district)
- Outhouse East LGBT+ issues in Colchester

Case work

Areas of law

- Family law
- \Box Housing (combined with Family = 70%)
- Employment law
- Consumer
- Wills
- Discrimination
- Welfare Benefits
- LGBT+

Excluded areas:

- Immigration
- Debt
- Criminal Law
- Last year took on 131 cases (compared to 62 previous year 111% increase)
- **Provided next steps in an increasing number of cases**
 - Family Law applications
 - Advocacy with the council
 - Ombudsman applications
- Students can also shadow lawyers at Suffolk Law Centre, Refugee Action and on clinic pro bono nights
